We had the privilege of welcoming the Axis Theatre to our school for a performance of the play, 'Where Have All The Buffalo Gone'.

The play, inspired by the Metis creation story and interwoven with a love story, provided a powerful and emotional narrative. Through a series of scenes, it illustrated the gradual disappearance of the buffalo—first due to the fur trade and later though the impacts of colonization and residential schools. The story conveyed how these historical events deeply affected the Metis people, their culture, and their connection to the land. The play concluded with a modern-day love story, bridging past and present. This performance was not only moving but also highly educational. It offered our students a meaningful learning experience and a thoughtful reflection.

SCHOOL POTLATCH

Our school recently hosted a powerful and meaningful Potlatch. It was an amazing opportunity for miyo-wichetown/creating good relation (Cree) between LDSS/SD91 and our 6 Nations. All the Hereditary Chiefs banned together to share important traditions and protocols for each Nation. They were all as honoured to be here teaching us, as we were to have them here teaching us. Many have shown want to come back individually or collectively for future events.

LDSS TRAVEL CLUB IS GOING TO PERU - Spring Break 2026







Hundiyin Indigenous Girls' Group

Hundiyin is a program developed by and for Indigenous young women and girls. It stemmed from research that was conducted in 2020 that asked female Indigenous youth about their experiences in the K-12 public education system. The program involves girls who live along the Highway 16 corridor, which is also known as the Highway of Tears. The First Nations that exist in the area are Matriarchal societies and women hold and carry a lot of responsibilities in the local Indigenous nations. The vision is to instill some of the traditional teachings from our local Indigenous cultures to support our whole community. This is driven by the belief that if you lift up women and girls, you lift up communities.

Carys Griffin delivered powerful grad speech, capturing the spirit of friendship, challenges overcome, and the excitement of futures yet to unfold.


